<u>Pet Safety for the Seasons</u>

<u>Halloween</u>

Halloween is the first holiday of the winter holiday season, and with that brings additional holiday hazards. Here are some tips and ideas for keeping your pets safe through the fall and winter holidays and seasons. Halloween is a fun-filled holiday for children and adults; however, the scary creatures, silly costumes, decorations and treats can be frightening and even dangerous for dogs and cats.

- ⇒ Keep Halloween candy out of pet's reach. Chocolate is toxic to pets and a lot of the candy can be harmful and make pets sick.
- ⇒ Who doesn't love a pet in costume? You may, but your pet may feel differently. If your pet seems stressed by the costume, remove it for their own safety. If they do wear a costume make sure it's comfortable and doesn't obstruct vision, hearing, or restrict movement. Avoid tying anything around your pet's neck to prevent choking or strangling. Add reflective tape to your pets costume if they will be out after dark.
- Although we want our pets everywhere with us, it may be best to leave them at home when trick-or-treating. All the stimulation, noise, lights and children can easily overstimulate and cause fear-reactions in even the best trained pet.
- Be alert when opening the door for trick-or-treaters. Make sure your pet doesn't dart out the front door. Consider keeping them in a room separate or blocked off from the trick-or-treaters. This will prevent them from becoming frightened and threatened by noisy children in costumes. Too many strangers can overwhelm a pet and cause them to be unusually protective or aggressive.
- Decorations such as jack-o-lanterns can be dangerous to pets with wagging tails or curious noses. Avoid house fires and injured pets by keeping candles out of reach or by using a low-heat, battery operated light instead.

Fall/Winter weather

As the days get shorter and dusk comes sooner don't forget the reflective collars and gear.

- ⇒ Even in very small amounts, anti-freeze can kill your pet. Symptoms may not show up for a few days and then it may be too late. Store anti-freeze in tightly closed containers and in a place pets can't reach. Always clean up any spills immediately and thoroughly. Consider switching to a safer Propylen Glycol product.
- ⇒ Ice melt can irritate your pet's sensitive skin. Wipe their paws and for those small pets who are close to the ground, their bellies too.
- Don't leave your dog outside in the cold for long periods of time. Wind chill makes days colder than actual temperature readings. Be attentive to your dog's body temperature and limit its time outdoors.
- Be extra careful when walking or playing with your dog near frozen lakes, rivers or ponds. Your dog cold slip or jump in and get seriously injured.
- ⇒ Be very careful of supplemental heat sources. Fireplaces and portable heaters can severely burn your dog. Make sure all fireplaces have screen, and keep portable heaters out of reach.

Winter Holidays

Many holiday plants can lead to health problems in dogs and cats. Among the plants to keep out of reach are holly, mistletoe, poinsettias and lilies.

- ⇒ Anchor Christmas trees to the ceiling/wall to keep it from falling on pets.
- Pets, particularly cats, can be tempted to eat tinsel which can block the intestines. Hang tinsel high and securely to keep it out of reach of pets. Glass ornaments, spray-on snow, ribbons, wrapping or anything a pet can swallow is also dangerous. Try to hide electric cords to prevent pets from chewing on them. Also, do not tie ribbons around your pet's neck or limbs.
- Prevent ingestion of tree water. It often contains preservatives which are sugar based and very inviting to pets as well as other toxic chemicals (fertilizers, insecticides and flame retardants) that were used on the tree.
- ⇒ The holidays are both a wonderful and a stressful time. The constant stream of visitors, parties and traveling can take a toll on both you and your pet. Make sure to spend quality time alone with your pet. This will allow you to observe your pet for any unusual behavior or symptoms, as well as to enjoy the tranquility the season can bring.



Directors' Desk - Cats in Our Community, How YOU Can Help!

As of this writing, we have 210 cats in our care. Historically, October is our highest intake month of the year for cats. October of 2016 saw 75 cats and kittens brought to us as strays and October of 2015 saw 109 stray cats & kittens brought in. Our adoption numbers are high, but our intake has been higher, meaning if we see 80-110 cats come in this month, the cats may be running the shelter by the end of the month! In all seriousness though, we will work through it as always, but this issue has brought something to mind that I wanted to share.

A lot of times we receive calls from nice people who find stray cats coming around their homes. Often times, they'll provide food, shelter, and water because they feel bad about them being left to their own devices. Sometimes this goes on for several weeks or even months. Then something happens that makes the situation change and become hard to deal with...usually a litter of kittens, but sometimes a sickness or injury. Then, these nice people call us and want us to take the cat (or usually numerous cats). That creates a problem for us, as we are then stuck with the increased responsibility both medically and financially.

The problem with "I felt bad so I've been caring for it" mentality, is that with food, shelter, and water, you're only really going about a quarter of the way to what is actually needed. What is really needed is for the cat to be spayed or neutered. What is really needed is veterinary care and treatment for the worms, parasites, fleas, broken tails, ringworm, demodex mange, broken teeth, injured eyes, and the countless other ailments a cat without sustained care can easily have. What is really needed is for this cat to be placed in a home that can provide permanent care and forever love.

Food, water, and shelter is simply not enough. In fact, I am arguing for you to NOT simply feed these cats because you may feel bad. I am arguing for you to immediately call us for assistance. If you reside in a municipality that does not contract with us to take their stray animals, we will be able to provide you with the phone number of someone who will be able to help you. If you reside in a municipality that contracts with us for stray services, we will advise you to bring the stray cat to us. Allow us to take care of all of their needs while doing the most important things: breaking the cycle of reproduction and disease.

With so many cats in our care right now, you may be thinking I'm a little crazy to ask for more...but how do you think we got so many in the first place? The more we can get these stray cats off the streets, out of the sheds, and off the farm equipment, the less there are to reproduce and spread disease. These sustained efforts, will produce results if we can help others learn what to do.

If you really want to help with this problem, when you see a stray cat, catch it (safely of course) and call us immediately. When you hear of a friend of relative who is feeding stray cats, educate them about how this really just perpetuates the problem. And support and donate us in our efforts when you can! =)


